JUDGING AND COMPETITIONS - Roy Killen

Our Print judge for October will be Stephane Thomas.

Our digital judges this month are club members: Chris Mannweiler for Colour, Mono to be confirmed, and David Richards for the Set Subject (Seasons).

October Set Subject - Seasons - Judge - David Richards

When we think about of seasons, we immediately consider the four traditional seasons - Spring, Summer, Autumn, and Winter. For this Set Subject, I want you to consider the possibilities across traditional, indigenous, or cultural seasons. Traditional seasons - these can cover a way of behaving or doing something by people in a particular family, group, or society for a long time (eg Christmas Carol singers). Indigenous seasons -these can relate to naturally occurring events in a particular region or environment (eg Spring - snow melt). Cultural seasons - these can relate to Religious or Cultural seasons (eg Lent, Thanksgiving). For inspiration, do an internet search on any of the above, and you will be amazed at the range of possibilities available to you.

Judging Criteria Depict a characteristic of a Season, either Traditional, Indigenous, or Cultural. Your image should have a clear and obvious connection to a Season, which is easily identifiable to your viewers. Think outside the square, images that depict a strong and unique characteristic in relation to a Season will result in higher results.




PSA Courses

The images I chose to submit were all colour landscape images that I felt converted well to monochrome due to the lighting at the time the image was captured, and the wide dynamic range.




















JUST 3 - Susan Slack

I'm Taking Over



The possum never at any other time showed his face. That was my one chance. I had spent many hours and several weeks sitting in a chair opposite the hollow holding my long lens setup. The hollow was at least 60 feet in the air and my chair could only be placed in a direction facing into the sun. Not ideal but when that moment came, I was so glad to see the face peering out under the leaf litter and showing a blue eye and a brown eye. I think the blue eye was possibly blind. Nature is tough and this shot shows how fighting for territory is essential.






How Large Can You Print Different Megapixels? – Bill Chambers


Many people who use digital cameras want to know how large they can blow up or enlarge their photographs based the megapixel count of their camera. This article is aimed at teaching you how much you can enlarge your photographs depending on what type of digital camera you're using and what the pixel settings are on your camera.

This chart outlines how big you can blow up your digital images.

To use this chart, find the resolution of your image and multiply it to find out how many megapixels the image is. For example, a 1024 pixel by 1024 pixel image would be a 1MP (1 Megapixel) image because 1024X1024 is approx. 1 million pixels.

Color	Quality	Comments	PPI Range
	Superb	Just about the finest quality possible.	200+ PPI
	Excellent	The casual photographer will see no difference to a slight difference when compared to Superb.	150-199 PPI
	Better	Better than Good, but not as good as Excellent. The typical photographer will be very happy with prints of this quality.	100-149 PPI
	Good	Quality that your typical photographer will be happy with.	80-99 PPI
	Fair	Quality will depend on the individual picture. For larger size prints the typical photographer will find them acceptable, but the sharpness will not be as high as a Good quality print. Compelling subject matter may trump the loss of sharpness. But doesn't it always?!	79 PPI or less

What is the difference between DPI and PPI?

It should be noted that the image enlargement size recommendations above are on the conservative size and will allow for optimal enlargement capabilities with the best and crispest possible picture. However, you can still blow your photographs up further if you don't mind losing a little bit of crispness. For example you can enlarge a 6-7 megapixel print to 1620 or an 8 megapixel print to 17x22. Better yet, you can blow up a 10 megapixel print to 20x30 for a good quality print.

(The chart above is entirely subjective!)

DPI

DPI stands for "dots per inch" and it refers to the number of dots of ink used when printing a photograph on paper. The higher the DPI, the more dots of ink are used, resulting in a higher quality print. When professional printers print a photograph, they will typically use a resolution of 300 or higher, which is considered high-quality.

PPI

PPI stands for "pixels per inch" and it refers to the number of pixels in an image. The higher the PPI, the more pixels are used, resulting in a higher resolution image. When printing an image, a resolution of 300 or higher is typically used, which is considered high-quality.

Differences

The main difference between DPI and PPI is the type of devices they refer to. DPI is used when printing images on paper, while PPI is used when viewing images on a digital device, such as a computer monitor or smartphone. When printing an image, it is important to have a high DPI, as this will result in a higher quality print. However, when viewing an image on a digital device, a higher PPI is not necessarily better. For example, a smartphone with a high-resolution display (e.g. 1080P) will look just as good as one with a lower resolution (e.g. 720P).














Club Christmas Party


Critique Corner


<u>Critique Corner</u> aims to help members to fine-tune potential entries by gaining feedback from other members before the image is entered into a competition.
