Jen's image "Sea Eagle with Penguin" was also runner-up in the Birding NSW Photography Competition.



Club Competitions 2026 – David Richards

Congratulations to our Overall IOTY winners for 2025 - Phil Whiteman and Annette Collins. Will your image be the 2026 IOTY Winner? Please remember that images must be entered into a monthly club competition during 2026, to be eligible to be entered into the IOTY 2026 competitions (subject to other club rules).

Our judges do not enjoy having to reject or disqualify images from competitions, so a timely reminder to ask you to refresh yourself by reading both the definitions and judging criteria for our 2026 Set Subjects, as well as our club competition rules. Where do you find them?

Set Subject competitions:

Go to **COMPETITIONS > Set Subjects 2026**, then scroll down to the bottom of the page where you can both view or download the Set Subject definitions and judging criteria. If you still have questions, reach out to the relevant club judge.

Club Competition Rules

Go to **COMPETITIONS > MONTHLY COMPETITIONS**. Here you will find the competition rules and definitions. Here are several common and recurring errors members make:

- you cannot enter the same image in a digital competition and a print competition in the same month.
- non-compliance with Nature definitions (particularly human elements)
- non-compliance with Monochrome definitions

Try and enter them at least a day prior, and then double check that your images have uploaded correctly. There is a lot of extra work created for our Competition Manager to sort out issues from Sunday night.



January SET SUBJECT - “Minimalism” Definition

Minimalism photography is an artistic style that emphasises simplicity, using the “less is more” principle, to strip away distractions and highlight the subject. This approach aims to capture impactful stories with minimal elements and significant amounts of negative space, creating clean and uncluttered images that convey a sense of calmness, peacefulness, and order. By stripping away extraneous details, photographers can create visually striking compositions that tell compelling stories with minimal elements, showcasing the power of simplicity photography.

Photographic Society of America (PSA) and Interclub Competitions

Our club is a member of PSA, and that allows us to participate in the PSA Interclub competitions, where we compete against clubs from all over the world. Full details about how these competitions are conducted can be found on the club website at **Competitions>PSA Interclub Competitions**. There you can also see latest PSA competition news and results. In previous years, our club has been very successful in the Digital sections – Colour, Monochrome, Nature, Photojournalism and Photo Travel. Last year, we started entering the Colour and Monochrome Print sections and had moderate success. Our club results from the 2024-25 season are summarised on the club website - select **Competitions>PSA Interclub Competitions>2024-25 Competitions** from the menu.

Results for Round 1 of the 2025-26 season were:

Small Colour Prints. LMCC gained 6th place out of 10 clubs.


Small Monochrome Prints. LMCC gained 3rd place out of 10 clubs.

Roy Killen received an Honourable Mention for his image “White Tailed eagles fighting”.



In the PSA Interclub, there are only two award levels - Merit (the higher one) and Honourable Mention (HM). In each competition, about 10% of images get Merit, and another 10% get HM.

Entries for Round 2 have closed, and the results will be available in February.

To view the images that were selected to represent our club in Round 1 and Round 2 of the current competition season, click on "Galleries" in the club website menu and scroll to the gallery you want to view. Then select either "Tiled Images" or "Slideshow".

Entries for Round 3 are open. Please visit our club website and make your entries before 1st March. All club members are encouraged to enter these competitions so that we can select the best images for our club entries.



Reminder: If you are a member of another photography club, you can only submit images through one club and that has to be the same club for the three Rounds of the competition season.

The PSA Interclub competitions are totally independent of all other club competitions, external competitions (such as NPF) and International Exhibitions. There are some restrictions on Interclub entries (in addition to the section rules). Please check these restrictions in the “PSA Interclub Overview” document that you can download from the **Competitions>PSA Interclub Competitions** menu on the club website.

Just 3 – Lindie Kolver


Swordbill Delving Deep.

This image was taken in Ecuador - it's always been a bucket-list destination for me. The Swordbill Hummingbird is one of the most specialized of all the Hummingbirds because of it's extremely long bill - in fact it has the longest bill in relation to its body size of any bird in the world. Of course, the tongue has to be at least a little longer than the bill and when not foraging for nectar, it's rolled up neatly in a cavity in the bird's head.

Shooting hummingbirds is anything but easy. They are tiny and super-fast. Humming bird wing beats are incredibly fast, ranging from **50 to 80 times per second in normal flight**, but can reach up to **200 times per second during dives**, enabling their famous hovering, backward flight, and agility.

Hummingbird-feeders can be found all over, so it's simply a matter of sitting still and waiting for the birds. The prolific flowers growing in abundance all over the country, make 'natural' photos possible. It is not possible, however to get them sharp and in focus without the help of an external flash – they are simply too fast – I've tried with speeds up to 1/2500, f/4 but with the lush growth around, shadows are dense and one needs to push the ISO way up, and I was not satisfied with the sharpness at all.

This one was shot with a Nikon D500, 105mm f2.8 lens with external flash, 105mm 1/2000 ISO100.

Australian Summer Fun.

This image of three girls playing Beach Soccer is very special. They were all dancers at a Dance School where I shot their practice-sessions and short videos as well as concerts for a few years. I arranged for a Beach Shoot starting at 6am one morning featuring these stunning girls. We had such fun that day and the girls loved showing off their dance-steps. This image was in **Focus**, the monthly glossy on the Mid North Coast, with more of my photos, featuring me as a local photographer.

This image was shot with a Nikon D500, 70-200mm f2.8 lens, f8, 1/750, 180mm, ISO140



Alpha Male Macaque

This alpha male macaque was taken on the island of Hokkaido in northern Japan in the Jigokudani Monkey Park. The most fascinating aspect of their behaviour is their love of Hot Spring bathing. This behaviour was first noticed in 1960 and 65 years later it's iconic in the species.

I have done really well with this image in various competitions and won Gold Medal in Nature in an International competition with it. It stays one of the favourite photos in my portfolio and has also won me some prizemoney (twice!) and an iPad from Viewbug in America.

This image was shot with my D500 (yes, my trusty workhorse, I'm currently shooting with my 3rd one!) my Nikkor 105mm f2.8 Macro lens, f5.6, 1/250, ISO140 and piggy-backing on the residual light of a flash triggered by another photographer stationed on the side of the Onsen (the hot-water spring-pool). I was just lucky that the Macaque clambered on top of the only rock in the Onsen and happened to turn his face towards the light source, water streaming down his body, when I took the picture. It is so different to all the other photos I have taken of the Macaques swimming, cavorting and snuggling together for warmth once they leave the warmth of the water.



Diane's Photographic Journey – Colin Schofield

When I think about Diane' photography the first thing that comes to mind is "story telling" and the gathering of information, a reflection of her career. Diane wanted to be able to tell the whole story much like a book.

This manifested itself on all our journeys where she would sit at a coach window, camera in hand against the window taking one image after another. This was to make sure she did not miss anything and the whole story could be told. When on a road trip she would take every opportunity to take photos of anything and everything at times she would like to stop at the Diane inopportune times!!! Of course, there were failures but over time these were far less frequent.



Another side of Diane's photography was detail. She photographed the small things, a cat sitting in a window, a doorway, a shop front, something interesting on the street or a sign that tickled her fancy.

Diane struggled a little bit with the technical side of camera science but was always learning. I was the one who always had to read the manual and then tell her what to do.

Our early photography was of people and places. Then for a number of years photographing the children, and Diane did photography as an elective for her teaching degree and we spent many hours in our laundry which cameo'd as a darkroom.

When we became involved in Blackbutt Reserve, the emphasis of Diane's photography switched to wildlife, and it remained until the end.

I can't say that Diane had a favourite photograph as such, but each image brought back memories of a time and place and when you consider one trip away, we came back with about 40,000 images we had a lot to choose from.

Diane continued to learn about latest photoshop techniques to the very last and was always hoping to be able to pick up her camera again.

I have selected just a few images that are reminders of Diane's story.



Better Photography Magazine

Many of you will be aware of Better Photography Magazine - [Better Photography - Tours, Workshops, Education, Reviews and Magazine](#) which is edited by Peter Eastway. I have been in touch with Peter, and he has allowed me to include content from the magazine in our newsletter. The Spring 2025 edition has an article by Len Metcalf on walking with your camera. This struck an immediate chord as I know it applies to many of our members and myself. Len discusses walking with a camera as an art making process. He urges everyone to read a book by Julia Cameron called The Artist's Way and describes it as a seminal book on creativity.

In his article Len describes a technique that he follows:



How to Walk as a Creative Practice

- Walk alone – solitude allows you to hear yourself think.
- Slow down – slower than you think... then slower again.
- Breathe deeply – let your breath settle your nervous system (learn to breathe properly).
- Leave your headphones at home – let the sound of nature in, birdsongs, ocean waves, the wind, bubbling brooks and silence... beautiful peaceful silence.
- Aim for relaxation. It isn't about fitness, speed or exercise, it's about creativity and self-care.
- Wander – let your curiosity take you down unexpected paths. It's here you will undoubtedly find magic.
- Walk without a destination – we don't need to arrive anywhere.
- Notice how your body feels – listen to your body, your mind and your feelings.
- Pay attention to the ground and feel the earth through your feet. Be a hippy and even try feeling the earth through your bare feet. Look up into the trees, the sky and the never-ending changes above. Look down at the textures, leaves and shadows.
- Let your thoughts come and go. We don't need to chase them or force them. We are walking to let our minds wander, as well as our physical bodies.
- Walk regularly – make a ritual, not a one-off event. Weekly, daily... return a little changed.

Then gives some practical advice on taking along your camera:

How to Walk With a Camera

- Carry light gear. Leave that heavy camera bag at home and travel light. We don't want the camera to dominate the experience.
- Set the camera up before you leave – have it ready to shoot, out and at hand. Simplify your process – take one lens for example.
- Walk first, photograph later. Photograph when you can't bare not taking photographs anymore, but allow yourself to get into a rhythm before being creative.
- Let the photographs come to you, chasing them is counterproductive. Pause often, stillness invites seeing and feeling.
- Walk until you forget you are holding the camera – let the camera become an extension of you.
- Look for the light, not just photographic subjects. Magical photographs come from noticing unusual contrast and light.
- Explore textures and tones.
- Use the viewfinder to isolate. Compose through exclusion. A great photograph comes not only from what is included, but what is excluded.
- Shoot intuitively – not everything, but following your emotions. Not everything needs to be explained or perfect. Let go of perfection. Perfection is for AI, Instagram and the masses. Imperfection is for humans, artists and real photographers.
- Allow yourself time to just 'be' without photographing. Some moments are better in our memories than in pixels.
- Review your images later, not while walking. Use the time walking to 'be' and don't be focused on the shoot or the image. Stay in the moment and leave the critique till later.
- Let your camera become your link between you and the world. It is okay to use it as a tool, as a love, as a lover. It is our love, use it with that intense emotion.
- Lastly, be gentle with nature. We need to champion her beauty, her preservation. We need to leave no trace, to walk on hard surfaces and think of those who will come after us. Nature isn't there to use, rape and destroy. It is there to work with us, to appreciate and celebrate. Nurture the connection and nature will nurture your creativity and your precious artworks of her.

These sights reminded me:


Alligator Sign. Yes, I was taking a photo of the egret and when I got home, I read the sign.



Cruising South Congress. This was a grab with my phone as this car passed by on Main Street, South Congress, Austin. It must have been legal; it had a number plate.




Taken at the YMCA. This is the car park sign, and you know there are cars with guns in them waiting for the owners to return.



Hidden Gems – Annette Collins

I took this photo back in May 2022. It was quite a nice sunset that night and I was hoping to get something out of it. This is the RAW File. 20mm lens, ISO 50, 0.6sec @ f16.






This is my first attempt at editing the image. I used Lightroom and Nik to get this result.



I was really disappointed in the edit. The actual sunset was quite spectacular, and I just couldn't get a result I was happy with. It lacked impact, drama and just didn't pop! So I gave up on this image.

A year or so later I started watching Nigel Danson on YouTube. I began with his Landscape videos and then progressed to watching his Lightroom tutorials on editing Landscapes. One of the main things I got out of the videos was the use of the Radial Gradient tool. He was using the tool to change an area the eye looks at. He applied the Radial Gradient tool to an area he wanted to highlight, by increasing the whites, decreasing clarity, decreasing dehaze and also increasing the warmth. This lightens and softens the area drawing the eye in.

I came across this image again after watching the editing videos and gave it a go. I am much happier with the final image now, it has more drama, contrast and I think it pops! Your eye is drawn to the horizon now instead of the highlighted areas in the clouds.

Bird Photography – Jim Zuckerman/December 2025 Issue

I have included content from Jim's monthly E-Magazine in the past. The December issue is the first part of a two-part feature on "Strategies for shooting Birds in Flight". The following is part of the introduction to his article –

Very few things in life are easy. Do you remember the saying, "No one ever promised you a rose garden?" With bird photography, you really have to work at it. It takes practice, an investment in good camera equipment, a lot of time, definitely a lot of patience, and an understanding that the ratio of keepers versus how many frames you shoot isn't even in the same league as photographing landscapes, cityscapes, architecture, or even people. When shooting with a fast frame rate, you might get one really good image in 100 frames or 1000 frames . . . maybe. If you don't try, though, you won't ever get a striking image of a bird, either perched or in flight.




Photojournalism

As members of our club, we can regularly enter PSA Interclub competitions in a range of categories including Photojournalism. Like Nature and Photo travel competitions there are specific requirements to enter these competitions and to what extent we can edit images that we enter in these competitions. You can read the full requirements on our club website at Competitions/Monthly Competitions/Definitions. The following is part of what you will find there.

"Photojournalism entries are images with informative content and emotional impact, reflecting the human presence in our world. The journalistic (story-telling) value of the image receives priority over pictorial quality. Images that misrepresent the truth, such as those from events or activities arranged specifically for photography, or of subjects directed or hired for photography, are not eligible. When Human Interest is specified (as a sub-category of Photojournalism), those images -4- Rev. 2 - November 2024 depict a person or persons in an interactive, emotional or unusual situation, excluding sports action."

So, what makes a good photojournalism image? I was looking at the news app on my phone one morning when I came across these images as part of the New York times reporting on the recent high rise apartment fires in Hong Kong on 27th November. Later it was on Instagram. I found this image quite confronting of the man in an anguished gesture as the apartments burning behind him.






